Ms. Hejazi is one of the researchers who worked on drafting the first Geneva Human Rights at Sea Declaration. She has been an outspoken and outstanding expert for international communities, as evidenced by her work as a researcher for the HRAS by her presentation on human rights and seafarers' abandonment at Empowering Women in the Maritime Community Conference held at the World Maritime University in Malmo, Sweden in 2019.

In 2019, she gave the first state-level speech on human rights at sea and seafarers' rights at the Shipping Ministry of Iran Think Thank seminar as the first female lawyer after the Islamic Revolution. In 2017, She spoke on human rights at sea and seafarer abandonment in India at the FINS & SAGAR International Maritime Security and Safety Conference.

Ms. Hejazi obtains a master degree in the Sea and Maritime Law from Ankara University, furthermore, she is graduated from International Legal Studies and Business International Law from Symbiosis Law School in Pune, India.

Formerly, she was a scholar and researcher at Human Rights at Sea (HRAS) for almost 4 years as well as representative of the International Maritime Federation (IMF) in India. Currently, she is a member of The Nautical Institute and WISTA and the researcher at DEHUKAM, the Sea and Maritime Research Center in Ankara University in Turkey.

Ms. Hejazi stands at the forefront of the development of human rights for seafarers; she is a leading expert for advocating the safe return and repatriation of abandoned seafarers, paving the way to better relations between countries, one solution at a time. She has helped to return hundreds of abandoned seafarers internationally and has worked with some of the world's most high-risk areas for ocean governance and human rights.
